



### CHILDREN'S HEART SURGERY FUND

#### Non Uniform Day: Additional Red Day

On Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2018 we will have an additional 'Red Day' to raise awareness and funds for the vital work of the Children's Heart Surgery Fund. This is a very special cause because - tragically – earlier this year, one of our families lost their baby son after a very short and brave fight for life. He was born with significant heart defects and immediately was faced with a range of invasive treatments and

surgeries. The family received such fantastic support from the charity and would appreciate our help in supporting its work - all in memory of their special son, Jax Gabriel.

On the day the children and staff can wear something red instead of their school uniform. For this privilege you are asked to donate £1+ per child. This is part of the charity's national campaign. On the day, donations will be collected on the gate by Mrs Atkinson and immediately passed on to support the work of this small charity. Mrs Atkinson is also happy to answer any questions you might have about the work of the charity.

Obviously we will be having another 'Red Day' for the pupils in St George's House in April to mark St George's feast day, and this will obviously still go ahead,





I would like to introduce you to Myla-Mae Hatcher. She is a lively four year old who has just being diagnosed with a very rare and life-threatening disease known as severe aplastic anaemia.

It is a rare and devastating disease which affects 1 in a million children. It causes total bone marrow failure which leads to a serious deficiency in all three types of blood cells we need in order to live healthily.

Just three weeks ago Myla-Mae was a normal, happy, healthy little girl who loved ballet dancing, gymnastics, swimming and school. This all came to an abrupt stop when her mum, Danielle, noticed bruising on her body. This prompted a trip to the hospital which then led to this devastating and life-changing discovery.

Since then, Myla-Mae has been unable to do the things that she loves, as she has a very weak immune system. Her hobbies have been replaced with trips to the hospital three times per week so that she can have transfusions.

As there is no cure, her best chance of life is a bone marrow transplant, but unfortunately there are not many donors on the bone marrow register.

90% of people can now donate directly from their bloodstream which is a comfortable and painless way of donating and the reward, potentially, is to save a life!

Myla's mum and dad, Danielle and John, are therefore urging as many people as possible to sign up to the register. It is very easy to do and you can sign-up online. Everyone who signs up will be sent a swab kit. They will be invited to swab the inside of their mouths, seal it and send it back off to the charity for analysis.





<u>You</u> could be the key to saving Myla's life or the life of others waiting anxiously on the register for someone to come forward. It is quick and painless and could make all the difference. Imagine if it was your child who was affected? Please help if you can. This is about a community coming together. Spread the word. Thank you.

Young Voices: Sheffield 2018




