#### The Feast day of St John Fisher – Our Diamond Jubilee Mass

On Thursday the community of St John Fisher, along with former members of staff, pupils, Governors and friends from the parish of our Lady of Lourdes and the Diocese of Hallam came together to mark our official birthday with a special Mass of thanksgiving.

Everyone was delighted that Bishop Ralph was able to lead our celebrations supported by Fr Paul. The occasion was made even more special by the fact that Fr Chris was able to join the Bishop and Fr Paul for the celebration of Mass. Fr Chris, who was Parish Priest at Our Lady of Lourdes before Fr Paul.

Prior to Mass our Chaplaincy Team welcomed Bishop Ralph and Fr Paul to the school and shared a specially prepared lunch with them both.



At Mass we were joined by many parents, carers and friends of the school as well as former pupils, staff member and Governors. It was wonderful to see them and give thanks for the parts they each played in our school's journey and development through the years.

We were also joined by great friends of our school, including Mrs Scott, Headteacher of All Saints Catholic High School, and Mrs Shaw who works with Mrs Scott in order to maintain strong links between All Saints and its 'feeder' primary schools. Mrs Nelis, Headteacher of St Patrick's Catholic Primary Academy and a former Deputy Headteacher of our school was also present. I was delighted to welcome back Mr Liam McGurrin, who was Headteacher of our school between 1982 and 2007. He even offered to support the music liturgy at Mass alongside Miss Pendlebury and Miss Kiernan, which was appreciated by us all greatly.

The Mass, which had been planned with the support of Fr Paul, was beautiful. Traditionally at St John Fisher our Feast Day Mass is an occasion when the children who have just received the Sacrament of the Eucharist



for the first time play a part in delivering the liturgy. Most also dress up in their special First Holy Communion clothes and the children all looked very smart and read marvellously with Mrs Drake.

Following Mass everyone was invited back over to school for cream teas provided by the PTFA. The hall was decorated, there were handmade table decorations and a display of old photographs, pictures of former staff, the School Log Book and even the dreaded Punishment Book! Former pupils were busily checking to see if their names were in it!







#### Garden Party Day!

On Friday the children and staff came to school dressed in the fashions from each of the six decades that the school has been in existence for. Everyone had lots of fun dressing up. In the morning the children in each class performed a dance based on a song popular in the decade thay are studying (which they repeated later for visitors). They also enjoyed curriculum activities linked to our special school Jubilee curriculum project.



At lunchtime, in spite of the fresh and windy weather the children and staff persevered wit the planned whole-school picnic and games enjoyed over an extended lunchtime before returning to class to continue with the curriculum activities. At 2.30pm the children had an opportunity to look at the exhibits before the Garden Party opened officially – many of which had been brought inside because of the suspect weather!













At 3.00pm the Garden Party was opened with a few words of welcome from Fr Paul. Right from the off, there was a big, happy and enthusiastic crowd!

Events started with a Jubilee balloon race and everyone joined in with a big count down to the release. The children in each class then performed dances from their eras of study culminating in a huge routine based on Michael Jackson's iconic 'Thriller'dance, involving all the children in Years 5 and 6.













The children in Y5 worked really hard as they then ran their own stalls as part of the 2017 PTFA-sponsored Enterprise Challenge. There was also a range of other stalls including 'Splat the rat!' which was eventually won by Alex Murray in Y3!





At 4.00pm we were joined by the Lord Mayor of Sheffield, Councillor Anne Murphy, who was shown around and introduced to children, parents/carers, colleagues, Governors, the PTFA and former staff and Governors. She was very interested in our journey as a school and wanted to meet as many people as possible.

It was a wonderful two days of celebration befitting our Diamond Jubilee. I would like to thank my colleagues and Governors for all their hard work; you; the parents and carers for all the support they give our school; our wonderful PTFA for all they did to make the two days so special (including all the unseen hours of preparation behind the scenes); Bishop Ralph and Fr Chris for their support; Fr Paul for all he did to help us plan the liturgy and for opening the garden party; all previous members of staff and former pupils who were able to join us and finally the children – the reason we are all here – for being as fantastic on Thursday and Friday as they are every day! # St John Fisher Children Sharing Sheffield World War One Stories

A world premiere of four plays based on Sheffield World War I history.

The Heritage Lottery Funded Project, 'Sheffield Stories', has been working with pupils from Years 5 and 6 at four local schools – Charnock Hall, Rainbow Forge, Birley, and St John Fisher.

When it came to creating the four plays we wanted to reflect this focus and decided that all the stories should have children or young people at their centre.

The impact of the Great War on this section of society was deep and profound, but has not always been acknowledged or explored.

The four stories centre on the ordinary lives of WW1 survivors and their families. These are



remarkable, resilient, courageous people, struggling to rebuild lives shattered by the devastating impact of global war. On Wednesday and Thursday our Y6 children will perform their play 'Aliens'.

'Aliens' is inspired by a letter written to the Sheffield Telegraph and Star in May 1915. A young woman, Winifred Burnett, tells the story of the Attercliffe Riots and her part in trying to help her friend, the daughter of one of the German-named families attacked.

Prior to the First World War there were, of course, very close links between Britain and Germany. The German Kaiser was Queen Victoria's nephew. The British King George and Kaiser Wilhelm were first cousins. There were many academic and trade links between the two countries. During the Victorian and Edwardian periods many German families had moved to Britain and established homes and businesses. Notable amongst these were the German pork butchers. Almost every pork butcher in Sheffield at the beginning of the First World War was German or of German descent. They were renowned for their expertise in the art of sausage making!

In our play we make Winifred's friend, Margaret Hahnemann, one of the younger members of a pork butcher family resident in Sheffield for generations. Margaret falls victim to the Sheffield anti-German riots in May 1915, after the sinking of the Lusitania. Feisty Winifred attempts to rescue her. Sadly she has to let Margaret fend for herself as the consequences for her own family are tragic...

The play also reflects the status of women at the time of World War I, and the research done by one of the schools on entertainment. There is a short silent film entitled "The Woes of Winifred" telling the story of the riot. This was made with the whole Year 6 class.

The Year 6 children performed the world premiere of the play on 28th and 29th June. The performances formed the heart of the celebration event of the two-year Heritage Lottery Funded Project organised by Whitworks Adventures in Theatre, a company that specialises in bringing history to life using the arts. "It has been so exciting working with the year five and six children from the schools. They have been involved in the creation of the scripts and have really grasped what it is to understand how people may have felt in the past." said Gertie Whitfield from Whitworks Adventures in Theatre as reflected in this comment by one of them: "I enjoyed that we learnt about what could happen in the war and what it was like to live at the time."



The Lord Mayor of Sheffield recognises the importance of this project during the World War One commemoration period and will attend the first performance on the evening of 28th June.

A Y5 pupil from St John Fisher Catholic Primary summed up the importance of the project: "I enjoyed all of the acting and I also loved reading all of the stories that showed us how different people's families lived through the Great War." #### Safeguarding Issue: Snapchat

Snapchat has just had a huge update. It now shows where any of the user's (your child's) friends are at any time. It uses GPS to precisely pinpoint on a map where the users are, even changing to a car when they move quickly. Your child and other users are depicted by a Bitmoji (as seen below).

Once you get onto the Snap Map it'll show you where your Snapchat friends are and what they are doing there if they share a picture. The update also allows you to upload Snaps to the "Our Story" so that anyone can see your picture.

Don't worry though - if you don't want your location shared then you can set up a "Ghost Mode" to keep it private.





It may sound like innocent fun but if your children have their location shared then people can potentially track them down.

The map shows exactly where they are which has raised serious concerns. While they would need to know your child's username, and for them to accept their friend request, to access this information it is often easy to find it online.

I urge you to check your child's settings, ensure they are set to 'ghost mode' if necessary. If you haven't done the update yet (as from 21st June), 'Ghost Mode' will not be available.

# To turn on 'Ghost Mode'

- 1. open Snapchat onto the camera screen
- 2. pinch inward on this screen (as if you're trying to make it smaller)
- 3. you'll then be taken to the map screen and will see your Bitmoji, (or your green silhouette)
- 4. click on it and your settings appear at the bottom of the screen
- 5. click there and turn 'ghost mode' on

#### Please note that children under 13 years of age should not be using the app.

# **Important Reminders**

#### **Nut Allergies**

Please be considerate to the fact that we have several pupils who live with serious nut allergies when you prepare packed lunches for your children to eat in school or on an educational visit. Carefully choosing non-nut products can help reduce the risk of one of our vulnerable pupils suffering a bad reaction. Your support in this matter is very much appreciated. Thank you.

#### Snacks

Children are allowed to bring pieces of fruit or raw vegetables or raisins to eat as a snack at morning and/or afternoon break. They are **not** allowed to have crisps, chocolate, cereal bars, packets of yoghurt or chocolate coated raisins as snacks. Children are also not allowed to eat items from their packed lunch at any time other than at lunchtime. Thank you for your support.

#### Sun Smart

We encourage our children to be 'sun smart' - safe in the sun. They are encouraged to be sensible and to wear a sun hat and drink plenty of water. We ask that sun/UV protection cream is applied liberally before school so that children do not need to come to school with sun cream in their bags. Quality products should last for the duration of a school day. If, however, your child does need sun cream applied during the course of a school day, do not just send your child in with some. Instead, please arrange to speak to Mrs Pickering who will discuss a care plan with you. This will ensure that your products are labelled properly, stored safely and used in strict accordance with the care plan you draft together.


