Pupil Premium

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools where there are children from low-income families who are currently eligible for Free School meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after by the local authority continuously for more than six months.

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit to support these pupils. However, we will be accountable for how we have used the additional funding and from September 2012 we are required to publish online information about how we have used the premium. This will ensure that parents and others are made fully aware of the Premium and the extra support that pupils receive.

Principles

- We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all our pupils.
- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups: this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately addressed.
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all children who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged. In addition some pupils who do not receive free school meals may have some significant barriers to learning.
- We reserve the right to allocate funding to support any pupil who has legitimately been identified as being disadvantaged or at risk of being unable to access learning effectively.
- Pupil Premium funding will be allocated on a needs basis, linked to analysis of outcomes for pupils. Limited funding and resources may mean that not all children who receive free school meals will be in receipt of pupil intervention at any one time.
